Service Dogs

The Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA) protects the rights of individuals who rely on service animals.

What is a Service Animal?

A service animal is a dog that has been trained to help a person with a disability. This does not include emotional support animals, therapy animals, or animals whose sole purpose is to provide comfort.

How can I tell if the dog is service animal?

Staff can ask two questions:

- 1) Is the dog a service animal required because of a disability?
- 2) What work or task has this dog been trained to do? No proof or certification is required.

Where are service animals allowed?

Generally, where the public is normally allowed.

When can the service animal be excluded?

Staff can ask to have the service animal removed if:

- 1) the dog is out of control and the handler cannot regain control.
- **2)** the dog is not housebroken. If staff requests that the dog be removed, they must offer services or goods to the handler without the service animal there.
